Continuity of Care: Contact at least one patient more than one time. (follow-up visit, or follow-up phone call) b. Comprehensive care c. Coordinated care d. Collaborative care e. Family-oriented care Caring for the ill person at home; Communication & counselling skills Documentation of medical information, medical records in family practice; Ethical and legal issues in family practice; Teamwork practice, management and leadership skills: clinical audit, quality assurance, introduction to health economics; Life-long learning, information retrieval, and continuing professional development; Health of the doctor and his / her family.
