Course Purpose and Objectives	The course offers a broad discussion of the history of international relations from the end of the Second World War until the end of the twentieth century. It is divided in four modules. In the first module the various phases of the Cold War are examined: causes and origins, 'hot' crises and 'détente' periods, the 'second' Cold War and the end of the bipolar system. The second module discusses decolonization and the rise of the Third World. In this context, the demise of the European empires in South Asia, Middle East and Africa, the rise of new powers and the non-aligned movement are examined. In the third module, the Palestinian Question from the establishment of the state of Israel until the end of the twentieth century is discussed. The last module examines European integration from the mid-1940s until the recent enlargement of the European Union. In all cases, the seminar emphasizes Greece's and Cyprus' role and participation in peripheral, European and international developments, which influenced, and in many cases decided, the current global status of the two countries.						
Learning Outcomes	 Upon successful completion of this course, students should be able to: Recall central developments in the history of the post-war world. Describe basic features of the post-war international system. Analyze local, regional and international developments in their historical perspective. Link the various phases of post-war history and bring forward their various interconnections. Interpret Greek and Cypriot foreign policies within the framework of its domestic and external factors. Evaluate post-war international politics from the superpowers, especially the USA and USSR, pespective.
