Course Purpose and Objectives	The course deals with the scientific branch of museum education and aims to familiarize students with its importance, its characteristics, its theory and practices. It also aims to explore the school-museum relationship in the context of non-formal and informal learning, and to address museums, monuments, cultural heritage sites, works of art and material culture as educational starting points. Specific objectives are the study of theoretical and methodological terms for designing and implementing museum educational actions and Programmes to take place in both cultural sites and the school environment.

Course Content	This course deals with the theoretical aspects of museum education with emphasis on learning theories in the museum. It also addresses the practical applications with emphasis on the design of educational programmes and the relationship of school teachers with museum educators. The museum is treated as a space for organizing educational programmes and educational activities for specific target groups with emphasis on the museum and school relationship, from which the vast majority of operating educational programmes has emerged. Also, the course presents the design and implementation stages of museum educational actions and programmes (phases before, during and after the visit), with emphasis on preparation, implementation and evaluation. In particular, the course includes topics on contemporary museum (typology and collections), learning theories with an emphasis on learning through objects, the history of museum education in Greece and the world, the role of the museum educator, the school-museum relationship, the planning, implementation and evaluation of museum educational actions and programmes. In this context, examples of museum educational programmes in Greek and Cypriot museums are presented. There is a special mention in the planning of actions using new technologies and in cocuration participatory actions.
